Appeal against the decision of the Minister for Agriculture, Food and the Marine to refuse an Aquaculture licence for the cultivation of oysters on bags and trestles at Site T05/546A on the foreshore in Cork Harbour.

Please also note that a person who refuses or fails to comply with a requirement under section 47 (1)(a) shall be guilty of an offence.

Further to your letter to me of 21/2/22 I am writing to you to provide the information you require.


The site will be accessed by boat and not by land as Spike Island does not have a land based access route. I don't think this sea access route can really be shown on a map as there may be time constraints due to tide level, and which area is being worked on, which could necessitate using a different route. The site can be accessed from the North, East and West. I have attached a map showing possible routes. Access across and within the site and for initial set up will be by boat. I have the use of the site located at Fota Oyster Farm Ltd., at Rossleague, Cobh. It is an existing oyster farm. Any equipment required will be stored at Fota Oyster Farm Ltd.

I am currently in correspondence with the board of Spike Island with a view to enabling the proposed activities enhance the tourism aspect on Spike Island. I have attached a copy of my proposal to them. As you will see I am very open to the possibility of reducing the scale.

Dear John.

Further to our telephone conversation back in June 2021 I am writing to you to outline a few ideas I have for an oyster attraction that may benefit tourism on Spike Island.

There are a number of oyster related tourism enterprises in Ireland currently. Sligo Oyster Experience, Flaggy Shore Oyster Experience and Kelly's farm tours to name a few. These tours are becoming more popular amongst tourists as they are different to the normal tourist attractions. Visitors are given a tour of the farm (if the tide allows), an insight in to the production cycle and an opportunity to open and taste the oysters. A customer of mine has a shell museum above the factory floor of his oyster farm in France which attracts 30,000 visitors per year. It shows the possibilities.

Different production methods which are used in Ireland and Europe could be showcased as part of the tour/experience. These methods vary from site to site around Europe. The attraction could demonstrate the most popular methods in use such as bag and trestle, floating bag and suspended culture.

With the aid of a small parcel of land on shore a dry demo area could also be set up to mimic what happens at sea, this would allow tours regardless of tide time. It proved

invaluable in the past to train employees and demonstrate to visitors how the technique works.

Without knowing your intentions for the building below, I think it would be ideal to use for the oyster attraction. It has an entrance and an exit and some outside space at the rear.



A visitor shop is something that could complement the attraction. Oysters and other products could be available for visitors to purchase Educational school tours could be facilitated to teach schoolchildren the history of oyster farming and the benefits of organic farming.

There are probably a lot more possibilities to mention but I hope you have an idea of the options which an attraction like this could add to the Spike Island experience. Sorry for the delay in responding but the past 8 months have been hectic.
